#### **ELECTION UPDATE**

At the South Cambs District Council local election Neil Davies was successfully re-elected as District Councillor for Histon & Impington and Orchard Park. Neil is an Independent.

Although Histon & Impington Parish Council were up for election this year, it was in the end an uncontested election, as 19 people came forward for the 19 places.

Three members decided not to stand this year. Hooda Abdullah has been on the Council for 17 years, having served on Impington Parish Council prior to the grouping of the 2 Parish Councils. She could always be relied on to ask difficult questions when most needed! Her excellent contribution to youth matters has to be of special note, and Council are pleased she wishes to remain involved with their youth work for the coming year.

Derek Marston has been on Council for coming up to 7 years and his sterling work as Chair to the Environment Committee has been most appreciated in recent years.

Ruth Moulder has been with the Council since shortly after the grouping 4 years ago and has focussed on Sustainability issues, as convener of the Sustainability Working

Party. She too is happy to remain involved with that Working Party.

At the Annual General Meeting David Jenkins was re-elected as Chairman of the Parish Council, and has informed the Council he will not stand for this position next year. Cedric Foster decided not to stand for Vice Chairman again, and Andy Butcher was enthusiastically voted in for that post for 2016-17. Andy says:

"I would like to thank everyone for their kind



words, advice and offers of continued support in this exciting and "not to be underestimated" challenging role within our ever flourishing community. I intend to grasp this opportunity with both hands, utilising my skill set

and enthusiasm to build on these foundations, ensuring we have a sustainable community, now and for generations to come. With evermore pressures being placed on our services and facilities by budget cuts I want to ensure that the quality provided is maintained, and if not, improved. In the coming year I intend to drive efficiencies into our processes and working methods to ensure what we offer is as effective as reasonably possible".

#### LOOK OUT FOR US OUT AND **ABOUT!**

The Council has taken delivery of a very charming electric Piaggio vehicle and once all the documents are received it will be put to good use in the village by our staff when litter picking and carrying out repair and maintenance to our assets.



This has been funded from Section 106 funds given to the Council to use only on community facility maintenance. This should enable us to save on contractor budgets for some works as well as ensuring our staff have the right equipment to carry out their evergrowing tasks around the villages

#### **WORKS AT THE GREEN**

The County Council has completed works on The Green to improve safety. This includes the installation of a zebra crossing which was a hot topic when I first joined Histon Parish Council and has been ever since; and only came about by the right question being asked at the right time. Tying in the new streetlight with the Belisha beacon and the provision of a cowl has soften its impacted, which is important in such a sensitive area as The

More recently the final phase of this work, which included the narrowing of the splay at the mouth of Station Road and the tidying of

the kerb outside The Coop, the straightening of the curve by the crossing has just happened. This should make parking easier and return some area to The Green for everyone's benefit.

At the same time work

from the 'Local Highways Initiative' has happened, most obviously the kerbing outside the Cambridge Building Society has been

tidied, encouraging crossing at safer points elsewhere.

#### THE VILLAGE ROAD ADOPTION **SCHEME**

The scheme whereby residents adopt a road has caught the imagination of many people, and now the village is over 90% covered.

What is involved? Residents keep their road or area tidy of litter and are provided on long term loan a litter grabber and gloves. During their walkabout if they spot potholes, blocked road gullies, fly posting, graffiti, fly tipping and overhanging vegetation on public paths, they report to me and I will ensure the proper authority receive an email notification. Also if the road name plate is damaged this should also be reported to me.

Removal of Advertisements? Adopters have the authority to remove commercial advertising and out of date advertisements as these can be unsightly.

How often should we do a litter pick? This is entirely at adopters discretion to suit themselves!

Does this scheme replace the quarterly Big and others may still like the formal occasion of the Big Tidy Up. The next Big Tidy Up event

Are organisations and businesses involved too? Yes. Year 7 students at IVC and the Histon & Impington Junior School are litter picking their areas. Hain Daniel (formally Chivers) also litter pick along their perimeter fence with Manor Park back foot path. The RBS and PAY SAFE both of The Vision Park volunteer their staff do a large section of The Guided Bus pathway and verge.

Are neighbouring villages involved? Yes. The Oakington Rotary Club and Girton Sustainability Groups often join our quarterly events by litter picking the roads that adjoin Histon. Cottenham have asked to join forces to clear the path and verge from Cottenham to Histon (B1049). It has been suggested that we start from the edge of our villages and meet in the middle. Provisionally we have agreed the evening of Tuesday 14th June.

Who funds the events? Our Parish Council provide litter grabbers and gloves and makes a contribution to the Methodist Church as a thank you for providing refreshments on the Saturday mornings of the Big Tidy Up events.

The Big Tidy Up organisation (part of Keep Britain Tidy Charity) provides us with strong litter bags, tabards and any advertising material. We have to pay for postage which the Parish Council pick up.

#### THE STRAWBERRY 50 CYCLE RIDES: A FUN COMMUNITY CYCLING EVENT



The second Strawberry 50 will take place on Sunday 4th September when we hope that over 500 cyclists will again take part in the event. The first running in 2015 was an amazing community event with 535 cyclists spread across the three routes.

The Strawberry 50 will offer the same routes as last year:

The Strawberry 55 - a 55 mile cycle ride around country roads in South West Cambridgeshire through beautiful countryside designed to appeal to club cyclists and cyclists who would like to participate in a challenging ride

The Strawberry 28 - a 28 mile cycle ride around country roads in South West Cambridgeshire for recreational cyclists who prefer a more leisurely ride

The Strawberry 14 - a 14 mile family orientated cycle ride along the Guided **Busway** 

All rides will start from Histon & Impington Recreation Ground. The Strawberry 55 and 28 start from 9:00 am to 9:30, and the Strawberry 14 family ride starts from 10:00 to 10:30 am. The event will finish at 3:00 pm.

We are delighted to announce that H&I will host its first Repair Café on Sat 18<sup>th</sup> June at the St Andrew's

Centre, 10.30am - 1.30pm. These events are hugely popular in Cambridge, Cottenham and Royston, in fact around the world - the thousandth opened in Holland recently but they have been springing up in Japan, Brazil, Germany etc.

The idea is simple - people are invited to bring along broken items and experienced repairers, who love repairing and hate

waste, do their best to fix them. Many of the repairers and engineers are very experienced - the average success rate is 70%. On the



18<sup>th</sup> you'll be able to bring along computers, mobiles, household appliances, broken toys and kiddie stuff, bikes, jewellery, small pieces of furniture, bits and bobs, all sorts really.

Booking will give you the best chance of getting your item seen and is strongly recommended. To book, send an email to <a href="https://historyco.org/lines/by-nc-nd-4">hisimp@repaircafe.org.uk</a> telling us what the item is and the nature of the fault (if you know). You'll be allocated a 40 minute slot and can bring more than one item but the second item will be deprioritised so others can get their first item seen. #### STEVE WILKINSON

Steve died in early April after many years of fighting severe Raynards disease.

There are many ways that people would have known Steve - as a passionate supporter of Histon Football Club; a member (Vice-President / Chairman / Vice-Chairman) of the Railway Development Society (including at National level) or as a member, and then Chairman of Histon Parish Council from 1976 to 2001 - with a stint of 16 years in the Chair.

In that latter role Steve: chaired the 1977 Jubilee Committee; was key to getting Homefield Park for community use; helped set up the concessionary fares scheme in the village; was a trustee for the Poorsland Charity; and took on more roles and seats on outside bodies than any Councillor - before or since.

Even during his "retirement" Steve was active, working on the Accreditation Panel for Local Councils - assessing the performance of Town and Parish Councils.

If there's a word to sum up Steve it was passion - whether sport (he played cricket and football for local clubs), transport in all its forms (except the guided bus); caring for a variety of animals; or for Histon & Impington.

He was widely read, and always finished Council meetings with a suitable quote, whether from the Bible, the Quran or Chairman Mao's "Little Red Book".

I did show family and friends my poetry and I received good feedback. People commented that they had felt the same as me during bereavement, and it helped to know that those feelings were normal.

I contacted Cruse Bereavement Care and 'Little Steps' is now in their head office library in Richmond and also in their Cambridge library. Cruse are selling my books to raise funds for their charity, in their drop-in centres in Cambridge and Ely. 'Little Steps' can also be found in the



poetry section at Heffers in Trinity Street, Cambridge.

'Little Steps' books are £5 each with 50% being donated to Histon and Impington Mental Wellbeing, and are for sale in St Andrew's Cafe and the Geographer.

#### 'LITTLE HISTON' COMES HOME

Some of you might have seen on Hisimp Chat a few weeks ago reference to someone wanting to sell his 00 gauge model of Histon Station also known as 'Little Histon'. The layout is a faithful representation of Histon Station and the Chivers Factory in the 1930s.

The layout is the work of enthusiast Graham Tandy from Norfolk who started work on the 'Little Histon' project in 2009 and finished the layout three years later.

The layout has been widely acclaimed and exhibited at national exhibitions and also featured in national railway magazines.



Graham was keen to sell to provide space at his home for another project and agreed to sell the model so that 'Little

Histon' can come back to its rightful home. The layout includes locomotives, buildings and rolling stock.

The purchase price of £1250 has been met

through donations from the Feast and Parish Council together with private donations.

In the immediate future 'Little Histon' will be displayed for the first time in the Recreation Ground Community room during the Rec Festival Sunday on Sunday 17th July between 12.30 and 5pm and Graham Tandy will be present to talk about his work. A new village group entitled Histon and Impington Model Rail Group are establishing themselves to help look after the layout and they will be on hand on 17th July as well

## HISTON & IMPINGTON MENTAL WELLBEING WEEK

The Histon & Impington Mental Health Forum who organised the Village Mental Wellbeing week in April are currently looking at the possibility of a village Mental Health Coordinator / Champion.

The feedback is currently being evaluated from over 150 surveys completed and an attendance of 350 across the week's events. At the time of writing there does appear to be a need for ongoing wellbeing services and Mental Health support in the community particularly on the preventative side.

The overall role objective would be to make Histon & Impington a mental health friendly community.

A potential role could include:

- providing face to face and telephone based contact and groups offering advice and guidance (sign-posting) to those seeking support
- organising the delivery of related workshop activities potentially becoming a qualified instructor to deliver Mental Health First Aid courses in community
- being responsible for ensuring those seeking support are able to access appropriate selfhelp material related to the above areas;
- referring clients to appropriate specialist services, agencies, and organisations where appropriate;
- joint working with other operational roles in the community eg Village Older People's Coordinator, Blue Smile, schools, Village Youth worker/ church children's and young people's workers, MIND, Doctors Surgery and other health professions.
- encouraging new initiatives including community support volunteers, art / creative to provide group therapy support
- encouraging / facilitating self-support groups eg for parents, young people and acting as a focus point to ensure continuity of groups where required
- Multi-agency approach with external organisations such as the NHS, doctors practises and other specialist providers of health or wellbeing related services
- play an active role in assisting with the development of health and wellbeing services in the community

The role could be similar to the Older People's Coordinator established five years ago which has made such a difference to the lives of dozens of elderly people.

There is much work to be done if the role should be progressed and funding will be an important part of the work. The Feast have been asked to consider help supporting this initiative but only if the the coordinator role should become a reality.

## ECHOES FROM THE SOMME - 100 YEARS ON

2016 marks the 100th anniversary of the Battle of the Somme, one of the largest - and bloodiest - battles of the First World War.

On 1<sup>st</sup> July 1916 the British Army attacked the German lines. This was the first major offensive made by the New Army Divisions - composed of new recruits who had enlisted in response to Kitchener's call to arms in 1914.

One such solider was my great-grandfather, Alfred. During his time in France he wrote letters to his wife Violet, describing the highs and lows of regimental life, the bond with his fellow soldiers and the heartbreak of being away from his family. The letters show a man who found himself in a totally unreal situation, an ordinary family man for whom the global events of the time had taken his life in a totally unexpected direction, and yet who took many positives from the situation. They also show a caring husband and father

who was trying to spare his wife from additional anxiety.

He describes himself "as a man might feel who wakes up in a strange hospital



bed after a concussion accident. He neither knows where he is or how he got there or for what purpose". And yet he remains upbeat and optimistic, describing things of beauty and humour, and the humanity and hospitality he found: "We marched ten miles through the most appalling slush to the place where we were to billet, and then found the place already fully occupied. Three officers found the tiniest of hamlets and undertook the interesting task of persuading the inhabitants to accommodate 1000 men, and here we are in a kitchen with Grandpa and Grandma, Pa and le petit Pierre, a child of four, two cats and dinner purring in the oven."

The letters lay undiscovered for over 60 years, before being found in the inevitable box in the attic. Fortunately Alfred had very neat hand-writing and even letters which are 100 years old, and which were written in the most difficult of conditions, are quite legible. I find them funny and poignant, but also inspiring and uplifting, and I'd like to share a small selection at an evening of readings. Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> June is the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Eve of the Battle of the Somme and so is an obviously appropriate date as well as being an early start to Feast week. The event is free - there will be a collection in aid of Feast Week and a forces charity. I hope you can join me - Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> June, 7:30pm, the Saint Andrew's Centre on Histon High Street.

The Chairman's report this year is structured around three themes.

Firstly Histon & Impington is a good place to live. This is evidenced by what happens in the community, how much good news there is and how little bad news there seems to be.

So what's happened in the year just gone by?

- The Friends of Histon Library seems to have gone from strength to strength;
- The three developers around the Station site have worked together and are presenting jointly to South Cambs design review panel in late May;
- IVC had a visit from OfStEd and came out positively: it's still rated GOOD and there's confidence that it has the ability to become EXCELLENT;
- The Hornets ran another successful tournament and this time there were no complaints about car parking on New Road. Double yellow lines have now gone in which should make it easier to manage on-street parking at this year's event;
- There are new cricket nets at the Rec. Graham Thorpe will be 'opening' them in July and then be the speaker at a celebration dinner as part of the 2016 Rec Summer Festival;
- The new pedestrian crossing by Brook Close to the Green was installed in time for the new school year. Associated improvements to the footpath outside the Building Society and to the parking alongside the Green have also been completed;
- Extra capacity was provided for the Infants School so that all local children entering school for the first time got to go to their first choice school;
- The concrete posts have gone from the footpath alongside the Busway at the back of St Audrey's Close;
- The villages enjoyed a funfair for the first time in Homefield Park;
- A successful senior youth club started at Histon FC;
- A Mental Health Awareness week made sure that the Community gives appropriate attention to mental health alongside physical health; and

 Heart Cambridge visited the Green one morning just before Xmas to make a presentation to 'the cleverest man in Cambridgeshire'.



And the bad news?

- Increasingly parking: anti-social sometimes and commuter parking becoming persistent;
- Speeding on Cottenham Road, Butt Lane and Gatehouse Lane;
- Bus reliability and access to the Guided Bus:
- The state of our roads, too many potholes, and footpaths;
- Street lighting and the associated fear of crime in badly lit streets; and
- The 'loss' of the ByPass Farm plot which was to be developed as formal open space to complement the Rec.

Of course much of this is reported on HI People so that the Council is aware of what's concerning the Community in real time.

All of this happens of course in the context of a community well served for leisure, employment and commerce and boasting multiple clubs and societies. It truly is a good place to live.

The second theme is the Parish Council, what it's done, how it relates to the rest of the community and what it might aspire to.

I've said before that the Parish Council is at the centre of the community but is not the centre. But because of where it is it achieves more than it might, simply by spending the precept:

- It gives grants to other agencies. For example it helps to fund the older person's co-ordinator and the mobile warden;
- It networks and brings other agencies together. For example this year it's facilitated joint working with and between IVC and Histon FC; and
- It encourages and facilitates as it does with the Enviro.volunteers, the Sustainability Group and the Big Tidy Up.

In addition to the highlights already mentioned the Council's committees have done much more this year. Firstly the four committees which spend money on services:

The Environment Committee chaired by Derek Marston has enabled increased use of the Council's allotments, it has adopted a redundant BT telephone box and supported the 'adopt-a-road' scheme whereby there's a network of residents in the villages looking after the street scene. I'm especially pleased to note its contribution to



improving the public open spaces in King's Meadows. This year we will see the new fencing at Homefield Park and I'm hoping that four of our grass verges will bloom with wild flowers thanks to the Sustainability Group.

David Legge's Highways Committee saw the



completion of improvements to the High Street but unfortunately missed out on a Minor Highways grant for this year. However it

is still working on the improvements to the B1049 at the Green and on the approach to the A14. It is working on a parking strategy, with the City Deal talking about some form of congestion charging for Cambridge commuter parking. This will be something we'll have to manage somehow, and will consult on options for a 20mph speed limit shortly. The Committee also has plans to install more cycle racks at key locations.

The Rec and the Children's play areas are looked after by the Recreation Committee which Neil Davies chairs. In addition to the cricket nets referred to earlier it has also installed safety netting to protect users of the bowling green and the play area from players aiming to emulate Carlos Brathwaite. It also raised the height of the fencing along the Chivers' boundary which the family/company partly funded. Unfortunately it was not possible to progress the tennis court project but this might be a part of something bigger this year. Watch this space!

Hooda Abdullah has chaired the **Youth Committee** through a successful year of transition. With our own employed youth worker we are now seeing increased activity, more joint working with other agencies and increasingly effective networking. New initiatives are planned for the new year to complement those already in place.

Denis Payne chairs the **Planning Committee** and the **Finance**, **Legal and Admin Committee**.

The Planning Committee is a regulatory committee and the Council's busiest. It has a statutory right to comment on planning applications and to respond to consultations. Last year it met 20 times and processed over 100 planning applications.

The Finance Committee does what you'd expect. It looks after the money and in 2015/16 oversaw spending come in on budget. That's good news. However we did underspend on the revenue side and that's bad news if we delivered less than we promised. The budget for 2016/17 is a little over £300,000 and the Council has set an increase in the precept of just 2%.

Normally this committee doesn't have much to shout about but it is taking credit for the splendid truck that the Council now owns.

Finally the **Employment Committee**: this is chaired by Brian Ing. The good news for this committee is that it has nothing to report. A stable workforce, good employment practices in place and first class employees. However we are proud of our initiative to give an apprentice a chance to work with our ground staff and will repeat this exercise this year.

The third theme is challenges. There are three and in no particular order:

The Neighbourhood Plan team has finally got its head around what it needs to do and mapped out a program. This programme will deliver improved engagement between the Council and the Community, an evidence base with which it can make confident decisions and a Neighbourhood Plan. I'm not sure if we can get to a referendum in May next year but we will be in a position to benefit from the work done later this year.

The central government squeeze on the

county and district councils offers us an opportunity and we need to approach it right. There's no point in this council simply replacing a CCC or SCDC spend. However if we can work together it might be possible to improve services for our residents and save money at the same time. A meeting with CCC adult social care last week suggested that there's not a lot of co-ordination at present and therefore some mileage in bringing the two organisations together. The big gains however will come from embracing the 'prevention' agenda and that will require more than just a repeat of last week's meeting.

We need to think about the council which we need for 2020 and move towards it. We need to be clear about our scope, the committees needed to manage it and the extent to which our current excellent staff can handle it. Our Clerks have responded well to increased delegation to them and going forward we need to recognise what they should do and what councillors do not need to do. I trust that our workshop in August will map out how we can take this forward.

There's perhaps a fourth which is to explore collaboration with other parish councils. That would not be easy but it's perhaps the way to cut costs through economies of scale and perhaps sharing of back office services. It's probably the only way that we can secure the PCSO cover which most people would say we need.

But of course this council's biggest challenge is to match and exceed its successes of 2015/16 so that next year's chair's report can have as positive a start as this one!

Finally thank you to all those who make this community such a super one to live in and who contribute to the effective working of this Council:

### The many volunteers and groups within the community

Our County and District Councillors

Our staff who keep us legal and make it all work.

### The Parish Councillors who put in so much valuable unpaid time

At this point may I thank Ruth, Hooda and Derek who are leaving us? Hooda and Derek have been excellent chairs of committees and Ruth has been the engine behind the establishment of the Sustainability Group.

We also lost two other councillors during the year: Marcus Dann and Shaun Lindsay. Thanks to them too.

And may I sadly note that John Dunn passed way during the year. John contributed broadly and his knowledge of matters drainage was invaluable. He is being sorely missed.

\*\*Precept is the parish part of the Council Tax bill provided by South Cambridgeshire District Council The Council has money in reserve for specific spends. Some it has allocated itself for projects, some (S106) can only be spent on specific types of projects, and it is required by its auditors to hold general reserves of half a year's spending. That looks like this:

The Parish Council increasingly realises that services are going to be devolved down to the Parish Council from higher authorities who are being forced to cut their own budgets. The Council believes it is, and needs to be, in a healthy position to enable any such funding to be available for services which are seen to be imperative to our residents as a whole. We have earmarked a budget for this purpose.

The Council's audit will be carried out by PKF Littlejohn LLP at the end of June 2016. If you wish to inspect the audit papers these are available at all reasonable times, by appointment, from 27 June until 5 August 2016


#### **BIG DIG SUCCESS** 14/15 MAY 2016

Over 80 people enjoyed taking part in Histon and Impington Village Society Archaeology Group's extremely successful first BIG DIG on a fine and mostly sunny weekend. We excavated eight test pits - all surprisingly different in character, emphasizing the varied archaeology and geology underlying the villages and the desirability of getting to understand it better. Interesting finds were made of most periods from Bronze Age and

Roman, with a wide selection of medieval pottery and later glazed and Victorian items, as well as bone fragments showing how many farm animals were running round the village.

The illustrations show our first test pit and the Bronze Age pottery found near Histon Church.

Test pits are 1m square and excavated in layers



A party atmosphere soon developed, with great excitement every time a find was made. Everyone was unanimous in saying how very much they enjoyed making new friends in the village and with our outside helpers. Warmest thanks to the test pit providers, who bravely let us dig their lawns up and were so generous in their support with cake and drinks.

We are particularly grateful for the expert supervision, help and advice of three experienced local archaeologists: John Stanford from Cottenham, Paul Clarkson from Chesterton and Terry Dymott from Comberton. Thanks also to committee members Jane Dean, Lynn and Roger Herriot, Steve Morris and Alison Turnbull who worked hard to contact and visit people and

distribute and collect the equipment.

After the digging we met at the St Audrey's Close Community Centre where local resident Nick Gilmour of Oxford Archaeology East kindly came to examine and discuss the finds. As well as the wide range of material recovered, he was very impressed by the amount of digging and sieving that had been done.

One lesson learnt was the need for an early start, giving time for those last few more packed deep layers where the very oldest finds are made. Another secret of success is the thoroughness of the sieving - finding everything you can - and we have been very good at this.

The next dig dates are 18/19 June, 16/17 July and 6/7 August, when we will explore some more areas of the village.



Steve has lived in Histon for 25 years, and both his children attended local schools.


He has been involved with Histon Hornets for many years,

All the work on display is for sale and you will find an infinite variety of choice at affordable prices.



#### THE FIRS - A HISTORY OF ITS ROLE IN OUR COMMUNITY.

The Firs was built in 1855 at the behest of a successful Cambridge Solicitor by the name of Orlando Hyde. Described as a 'very nice gentleman's residence', it was home to three further well-heeled families until purchased, in 1908, by Chivers and Sons Ltd. The company's chairman, John Chivers, had plans for "The Firs". It was to become the home of the factory nursing staff and host a multitude of village and factory events.



Over one hundred years later this building is still serving our community as a very busy Doctors' surgery.

It is twenty eight years since the Village Society published its original history of the property. A new edition is planned.
