The Pyrotechnician's Tale - Help light up the Village!

This year's Fireworks Extravaganza will be on Saturday 4th November, at Impington Village College, gates open 6pm, display from 7pm. There.... that's all the key information communicated, now for something more interesting.

We're blessed with community events that mark the year... the Feast, Open Gardens, the Flaming June and Bonfire Burn runs, the Beer Festival and Carols on the Green to name but a few. Each has its own group of volunteers and the Fireworks Extravaganza is no exception. So how did I get involved?

Well, I remember as a child being enthralled by our local display....not just the colours, light and sounds, but also those mysterious shadowy figures who wandered around

the field lighting fireworks, and who, presumably, controlled the whole show.

Several decades later, I found myself sitting in an Infant School PTA meeting when someone suggested I could be the "Infants rep" for the fireworks. So, the next evening I went down to the Red Lion, met with a remarkable group of people who organise the Extravaganza in our village and from then on, I was hooked. The team do a fantastic promotion job with posters, road signs, newspaper articles, school newsletters, and local TV....we appeared on Cambridge TV last year....don't tell me you missed it. And our local shops do a great job selling tickets in advance.

We work closely with Essex Pyrotechnics, who not only sell fireworks, but import and manufacture them too. This means that when we ask for a 'special', they'll do their best to provide it from their factory near Cambridge.

The day itself is a hectic one. We work in pairs securing the site, with each person setting up their own fireworks. Some are straight forward - a box on the ground. Some are a bit more complicated. Catherine wheels need a post and others need a combination of posts, weights,



string and a good deal of effort. Then there is the beacon....it needs four people to lift it onto its pole!

Firing is thrilling, exhilarating, controlled and planned. Some are fired electronically from a laptop but we still do things the old-fashioned way.....light the fuse, turn, walk smartly away, and then admire the result. With up to six of us on the field there is always a lot of action. It's a cliché, but safety really is our number one priority.

The end comes all too quickly. We set off our last,

biggest fireworks, and then stand in front of the audience, listening to the cheers and taking a bow, knowing that no-one can see us. We are those mysterious shadowy figures, and we've just delivered another successful Histon and Impington Fireworks Extravaganza.

The event relies on a huge number of volunteers, first aiders, marshals, ticket sellers, food sellers, car parkers, novelty sellers, MCs, litter pickers and clear-uppers. We're lucky in the village that so many people are willing to step up and do this. Please do volunteer if you can....you'll enjoy yourself.

Traffic Impact of Development - A Local Case

With so much development going on in the villages and Cambridge generally, it is interesting to

consider how much local traffic it generates. This article looks at the example of a single house which was built in 2016.

As the architectural practice who advised on the build was local to the village, they were able to walk to site meetings. One of the site labourers cycled from Chesterton daily, generating 175 journeys in total. By far the largest component were the journeys of the numerous trades (bricklayer, electrician, plumber, plasterer etc); there were 1,294 mostly in "white



vans". In addition, there were all the materials, which were delivered by a continuous stream of lorries and specialist vehicles, totalling 283 journeys arriving on site, including 76 skips removing unwanted material. By far the largest vehicle, which came from Doncaster, was the pile augur.

As every arrival on site requires an exit, the build generated more than 3,100 vehicular journeys through our villages over the course of the year (which averages about 14 per day through the working week, both white vans & lorries).

In terms of the economic impact on the village, the findings were surprising. None of the tradesmen actually lived in the village, although the majority came from within 15 miles. The local garage was the largest single beneficiary as at least three vans filled up there every week. Perhaps more predictably, Barker's Bakery enjoyed a distinct spike in trade in bacon rolls. Slightly further afield, the Travelodge at Bar Hill and Orchard Park were the preferred overnight venue for tradesmen who came from further afield and needed to stay overnight.

As the development of the village continues over the next few years, we need to be aware of the volume of additional traffic that will inevitably be generated.

Print-Out celebrates its Ruby Anniversary

PRINT-OUT has been in its present premises for 40 years, but before that was originally trading as Cambsprint from a tiny office behind Monteith's Electrical shop at 9 High Street, Histon. In 1977 they moved to their current location which started off just as a brick shell. It was fitted out using local craftsmen, the shop front being manufactured by Unwins Joinery who used to be in Station Road.

Starting out as a hobby (which has got a little bit out of hand) Mike and Jean Johnson have built the business, going through the many changes and challenges in the printing industry, from litho printing to the latest digital presses, always striving to keep ahead of technology.

Although it was hitherto unheard of to install Heidelberg printing presses in a high street

shop, Print-Out have always resisted working from an industrial unit, preferring instead to meet and serve their customers from a pleasant village environment and being part of the community. Having said that, with today's technology, work also now comes

from many parts of

the country and as

Today, they are able to print virtually anything from business cards to large architectural plans and banners.

Bonfire Burn-5th November

One of the largest sporting events in South Cambridgeshire returns to the village with the seventh running of the Bonfire Burn 10k on Sunday 5th November.

The 10k run again features a route including the Guided Busway and the Cambridge Science Park.

The Bonfire Burn is a charitable event and it is hoped that nearly 1000 runners will participate (931 runners ran in 2016). The run is also a home event for HI Runners the flourishing village running club formed in 2014.

The event, devised by race director Neil Davies in 2011, follows a multi terrain route from Impington, along the Guided Busway cycleway to the Cambridge Science Park, through the Park to Milton Road, before

returning to the Bus cycleway back to Cambridge Regional College. The route then proceeds into the country along the ancient Mereway bridleway, returning to Impington and the finish at the



village recreation ground.

Neil enthuses on how the run has developed; "The Bonfire Burn is a village community running event which seemed to catch the imagination of runners immediately it was launched in 2011, with many runners now returning year after year. We are really keen to encourage younger runners to take part and the minimum age is 14".

New for 2017 is an over 60s age category and a new, improved, specially designed medal for all finishers.

Online race registration is available at; www.bonfireburn10k.co.uk

The entry fees are £15 for adults, and £6 for Under 18s (the minimum age for entry is 14).

Organised and staffed entirely by volunteers, the event is sponsored by Impington Sports Centre, Progress Spire Impington, Tucker Gardner and Advance Performance.

The event is being organised by Friends of Histon & Impington Recreation, a charity that fundraises to improve leisure and sporting facilities, and provide sports and exercise activities for all ages on the village Recreation Ground.

Your HI

It seems to have taken forever. We've been talking about the Neighbourhood Plan for some time now but it's easy to think that we've made little progress. Fortunately that's not true. Following the big survey of last summer the Neighbourhood Plan team has made good progress translating what the community has said into a set of planning conditions which are what the Neighbourhood Plan is all about.

Because that is what a Neighbourhood Plan is — a set of planning conditions which set the rules for land use in the future. If these rules are followed by developers, and they are

conditions which
must be
followed, then
development
will follow
which responds
to the priorities
this community
has articulated.

Our Neighbourhood Plan has not been easy to develop because



(a) there's no single big issue which the community must address, and (b) our community is tightly bounded by Green Belt which limits development options. The survey told us that the Green Belt is valued but it also told us that we need to provide more affordable housing and that perhaps some development for that might be allowed.

The result has been a plan that allows redevelopment of existing sites as long as this protects jobs, retail in the High Street and elsewhere, and public open space. It also lays down strict rules for any housing development: this must be compact, sustainable and consistent with our community ethos.

Following a public workshop early in September, the draft Neighbourhood Plan is now online at www.hiplan.net. We will be using feedback from the workshop and subsequently to refine this before consulting on it at the end of the year. Then it will go into South Cambs' District Council's hands before a final referendum by the middle of next year.

Another Wonderful Year...

Under its new(ish!) Principal, Ryan Kelsall, IVC continues to go from strength to strength with 2017 proving to match the successes of 2016.

All secondary schools await August with bated breath. It is the time when GCSE and A Level results are released. Teachers and associate staff will have spent all those years working with the young people, for whom the grades achieved will define their progression to further education or employment and remain with them throughout their lives. It really is a big deal for all involved.

In 2016, IVC finally achieved its expected potential with stunning GCSE outcomes and it was placed in the top 3% of schools nationally for Progress 8 (the measure now used to gauge the progress by each student from the time they joined the school aged 11 by comparing them to every student with similar 'prior attainment'). Although the Progress 8 outcomes for 2017 are yet to be released by the DfE, the indications from the actual results are that IVC has matched 2016's successes. This is a tremendous outcome for the students (and staff!) who all worked hard to achieve so well. There are new GCSEs in English and Maths and the outcomes in these were particularly pleasing. For example, 14% of the cohort achieved the new grade 9 (in comparison to 3% nationally) - a stunning achievement for any school, but especially so for a school that is so comprehensive and inclusive in terms of its intake. Indeed 40% of all grades were at A or A* (or the new equivalent).

IVC is equally proud of its achievements with those students whose starting point in college was relatively lower in comparison. For these students gaining two or three GCSEs with supporting Entry Level qualifications is a tremendous success. Supported by excellent IB results (which come out in July) and A Level outcomes that were a real credit to the relatively small cohort, all this underlines the strengths of IVC.

It was therefore a great honour that the Real Schools Guide for 2017 placed IVC at the top of all secondaries for Cambridgeshire. This guide uses 50 data points for its analysis (and therefore reflects much more than just academic results). It is surely of real comfort for the village to know that the best of the best schools across the region is just on its doorstep.

This recognition of the strengths of IVC was further enhanced when it was successful in its application to establish what's called a 'teaching school alliance'. A teaching school is one that is recognised not just for its strengths with its students, but also for the work it does with developing teachers. IVC

will be granted additional funding to enable it to work in partnership with other schools to ensure education in Cambridgeshire gets even better.

Towards the end of 2015, the governors at IVC decided that it would be in the best interests of the college and its community to establish a multi-academy trust, so it could grow an organisation that might work with other likeminded schools. The Morris Education Trust (MET) was (legally) established in October 2016 and in April, Witchford Village College joined as well as the DfE granted approval for The Cavendish School, a (new) special free school for children with autism spectrum condition.

We are still in discussions with the DfE about the preferred site but it is increasingly likely to be built on the site at Impington, probably adjacent to what is known as 'K Block' (the area at the end of Park Drive). Fortnightly planning meetings are taking place with the civil servants overseeing the project and we hope to be able to open for September 2019.

So it's already been a very busy (but highly satisfying) year and all involved with IVC and MET are deeply appreciative of the support we receive from those in and around the community.

A Beacon of Fun Learning

Many parents may relate to the most commonly asked question by customers of Lighthouse Toys:

My children are going to a birthday



party tomorrow of a boy/girl aged x; what toys would you recommend?

While Tim & Sam Broad are well able to provide suggestions, after a few probing supplementary questions, this is not their main area of expertise. Since its inception thirteen years ago, there has always been a strong educational theme to their shop. To that extent they are not a typical high street toy shop, more of a niche player offering specialist advice. Their mantra has been "learning through play" which emphasises the importance of the parental role in supplementing classroom learning. Sam's background as a primary school teacher who specialised in special needs and Tim's years as an engineer influence the selection of toys. Each toy has an educational value - if you want to know more about any particular toy, just ask. Consequently the shop is known throughout the region - from King's Lynn to Saffron Walden and Newmarket to Huntingdon and Peterborough.

As an independent business, it does not try to compete with price promotions offered by the leading online toy retailers on their top selling items, who have massive advantages of scale. However, on individual items they may well be comparable. But then, it does not see itself as a commodity business; the owners much prefer to be able to advise customers on toys to suit their child's aptitudes.

An interesting new theme that is easily visible in the shop is the focus on toys for STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths). Anyone buying for children who have an interest in making things or in finding out how the world works, may well find something to catch their attention. Lighthouse Toys have sold STEM toys to some primary and secondary schools as well as universities across the UK.

However, the business is highly dependent on local footfall (although they also have an online offering at www.lighthousetoys.co.uk
The closure of the road to Girton for more than six months while the Guided Busway was being constructed dramatically demonstrated the impact of reduced footfall on the High Street, to the point of jeopardising its existence. To this day, the moral of the story remains "use it or lose it", which applies to all shops along our High Street.

Bishops, Station, Station Yard

These have passed through the Parish Council's Planning Committee but are yet to get to South Cambs District Council's - where the final decision will be taken. New School, Buxhall Farm

Please find below a statement affirming the County Council's position in relation to delivery of a school on the Buxhall Farm site:

"The County Council remains committed to delivery of the required additional Primary Education provision in Histon & Impington, as outlined in the Children and Young People's Committee Paper of 24th January 2017. The planning application for the Junior School site has been submitted and is expected to be considered by the Council's Planning Committee in due course. This is phase one of a two-phase project.

The Council recognises Buxhall Farm is a complex and sensitive site within the village. Detailed discussions with planners to understand the constraints and expectations for delivery of a school on this site are underway. There will be further public consultation on the design proposals in due course."

Stop press ... from your Highways Correspondent ...

You may have noticed that over the schools' summer holidays, some work was done to improve the area around the Baptist Church area, which interestingly used to be known as 'Impington Green', matching Histon's, nearby.

The improvements have focussed around making it safer for all, slowing traffic using Station Road, making it easier for pedestrians to cross while also improving the aesthetics (and some drainage issues that came up). As it is on a bus route there have been constraints on design. Echoing its historic status, this is an important area of the villages, being near the Early Years Centre and the Infant School as well as on the route of many moving round the villages and indeed the Church itself.

This work is part of a scheme which has been years in the planning due to the vagaries of securing funding; and the original plans were more ambitious but had to be tailored to the budget

of a Highways budget and so the decision was made, in order to avoid potentially 4-way lights affecting the B1049, to close off a short bit of Station Road during the schools' summer holidays to minimise disruption.

During the work, it was noticed that the new kerbline would remove a section of dropped kerb for crossing to the War Memorial; working with the County Council and the contractor, we were able to get this replaced, up to modern standard (tactile surface) and in a safer place.

The Parish Council's Highways Committee is hoping to apply for funding for a further tranche of work in the area improving the parking and bus stop provision which was beyond the budget of the current scheme.

Archaeology Group (HIAG)

Since the last edition, the group has held three more test pit weekends, focussing on the north west of Histon. Nine test pits in total were excavated during the summer at sites in domestic gardens and at Abbey Farm. Although no evidence of earlier structures or other notable features were identified in the pits, approximately 230 pottery sherds were recovered, of which we think approximately 70% are medieval or earlier. A single pit in Normanton Way towards the northern limit of

the village produced a third of the medieval pottery total, and was something of a surprise as it was beyond the northern limit of what we believed to be the core of the original Histon village settlement around the manor and churches. More work will be needed to investigate and understand this apparent anomaly.

Co-operation between HIAG and other local archaeology groups is increasing. Members

In addition to further talks into the New Year we are planning two drop-in open evenings and exhibitions at Histon Baptist Church on 12th and 19th Feb at 7-9pm. These will focus on recent archaeological discoveries in Histon and Impington and the surrounding area, and showcase our plans for future excavations. One objective is to excavate more test pits in Impington, which is currently underrepresented in our series.

LEST WE FORGET - Update on 2018 Commemorations

As the end of 1917 approached, Histon and Impington mourned 24 men and boys. Now any fit man under 50 could be conscripted. The mud and slaughter of Arras and Passchendaele was taking its toll. The home population faced food, fuel and labour shortages. Inflation was running at 25% and taxes were rising. All dreaded another winter, for the winters of this war had been exceedingly grim.

In the November of 1917 no one really dared hope that within a year the Armistice would be signed, but on the 11th hour 11th day of the 11th month in 1918, signed it was. There are several projects



planned to commemorate the ceasing of hostilities during November 2018. The Village Society hopes to prepare an updated Roll of Honour containing the names of all who served, in whatever capacity. A 'H&I Voices of WWI' performance will take place at the St Andrew's Centre. Jane Gilmour and Brian Ing are looking into purchasing a memorial bench. Dan Mace, together with help from IVC, hopes to erect flags in each street where residents served. Finally, a WI work party is manufacturing poppies made from recycled plastic bottles to represent each of the 385 veterans confirmed so far.

Hope Alive Tour

After 12 months of preparation The Hope Alive Tour started on April 1st. It's a charity challenge like no other. Treading in the footprints of the great anti-slavery campaigner William Wilberforce, it involved 12 runners, and a support crew, on an incredible 576-mile adventure run in relay, across four days and two continents.

The Tour began in Wilberforce's birthplace, Hull, and touched down in some of the key cities in the anti-slavery movement, including

historic centre of the slave trade, and Freetown, Sierra Leone, where



abolitionists established one of the first colonies for freed slaves. Here the team met the children, and provided some practical help at the centre.

The weather in the UK was kind to us, with very little rain, which was greatly appreciated by all the runners. Night time running along rural roads was particularly enjoyable. Arriving in Histon at 8am April 2nd, we were greeted by friends, family and the High Commissioner from Sierra Leone and some of his staff. His Excellency, who is ambassador to seven other European countries, had been incredibly supportive of the Tour. Standing behind the bar in the King Bill, he was tempted to pull a pint but opted to give a brief speech confirming he was sending out to Sierra Leone the Head of Chancery Alan Logan to meet us in Freetown and take part in the run! From the King Bill, we ran into Cambridge through St John's College to Ridley Hall; then began the long enjoyable run north to the City of Liverpool. Everywhere, we received a wonderful welcome and St James Church put on a fantastic spread and made us most welcome. We arrived at the Sierra Leone High Commission in central London, once again greeted by the High Commissioner.

The following day we flew out to Lungi International Airport, arriving at 4.05am on Thursday, where we were met by the Mayor of Freetown and a heatwave! With a police and military escort we set off on the last leg of the run. Joined by a group of elite Sierra Leone athletes we started the 26 mile run with a 6 mile climb, uphill all the way! The support along the way was fantastic.

Finally we arrived at Heaven Homes, greeted by the children. Despite one or two injuries we had collectively completed the Tour.

Strawberry 50

Eversden. The Rec had stalls for bicycle check-ups and demos (including e-bikes) from Rutlands in the village, and massage facilities.

with a stall, demonstrations of specially adapted bikes for those with different needs and their participation in the event. This group's involvement with future events is eagerly anticipated.

The event was organised jointly by the Friends of Histon & Impington Recreation and the Histon and Impington Bicycle Club, with the hard work of some seventy volunteers. The fourth Strawberry 50 is planned for the first Sunday in September 2018.


Faith and Football Enterprise Challenge



South Road Play Area and Dogs

The Recreation Committee have been working to improve the Play Area at South Road. The grass is now cut fortnightly in the summer and the hedges trimmed back in rotation on a three year cycle. The old roundabout has now been replaced by a very smart new model and the soft pour area beneath it repaired.



However, we do have one problem still. There have been complaints that some people are letting their dogs run unsupervised in the Play Area and some dog owners are not clearing up after their dogs. Firstly, any dogs if they are not under control, even friendly ones, can scare younger children and leave them with a lasting fear of animals. So far, we have had no reports or complaints of aggressive dogs but this is always a consideration. Secondly, dog fouling is unpleasant and in some cases can spread a very unpleasant disease, leading to blindness, if the dog-mess enters a child's system.

We would very much like to continue with the positive decision we took some years ago to keep this one play area accessible to families with dogs. We do, therefore, ask all dog owners who use this Play Area to act responsibly; keep their dogs well under control and clear up all dog mess.

We shall be monitoring the situation over the next three months. If things do not improve and we have further complaints, we shall be, reluctantly, forced to close this play area, as well, to dogs.

Caller fraud

A scammer rings you claiming to be from your bank or the police. Saying they need your help or a fraudulent payment has been spotted. You may be asked to ring back using the number on the back of your card. However, the scammer keeps the line open at their end so you make the call back to them. They may

ask for your pin number or ask you to key it into the phone.



YOU SHOULD NEVER GIVE

YOUR PIN NUMBER TO ANYONE IN ANY WAY.

There are many variations to this scam, you may be ask to give your card or money to a caller. The police or your bank WILL NEVER ASK YOU TO DO THIS. If you need to check anyone calling from the bank or police use the number from your bank statement or for the police ring 101

REMEMBER - Your bank or the police will NEVER ask for your PIN or to withdraw money

THINK - Never hand your bank card to anyone who comes to the door.

Door-to-door scams

If someone knocks at your door claiming to be from a company or local council, water, electric supplier, check their ID, take their card and shut the door. Go to telephone. DO NOT RING THE NUMBER ON THE CARD but have a list of numbers, electric etc, by your phone. Call the number and check the person. Genuine callers will not mind waiting.

If you are interested in what a door to door salesman is offering, take time to find out

about their goods or business and perhaps get two or three quotes.


