As with all Councils there's an election every four years for the Parish Council - and that's <u>this</u> year.

Parish Councillors are just ordinary residents who care about Histon and Impington and want to try to make a difference. There are 19 seats to fill - and, whilst some of the current Councillors are going to stand for re-election, there are some who are not.

Now more than ever it is important that good decisions are made at Parish Council level, as we face cuts from higher authorities that we may decide to try to fill at our level. We currently have a budget of some £400,000 pa to manage and this can be set only to grow in the coming years as more and more responsibility lies at local level. There is also a team of 6 employees for the Council as a body to manage.

This unpaid role is very rewarding and interesting for anyone interested in how our villages are evolving, residents' wellbeing, and what facilities we have on offer.

If you are interested in standing for the Parish Council, please feel free to contact the Parish Office to discuss the work and type of commitment required, or contact any current Councillor for a chat. Completed nomination forms need to be with South Cambridgeshire District Council by Friday 6 April 4 pm, with the period of nomination not opening until Monday 26 March.

Now is the time to:

- Get involved
- ♦ Have a say about local issues you care about
- Influence local services delivery
- Decide how local money is spent

If more than 19 people put themselves forward for election, we'll have a poll on 3 May, at the same time as the District Council elections.

They hope we are proud of the finished programme!

It was great to see local people featured; Dan Mace of the Community Orchard, Sue and Surinder Saini from Station Stores, Kilo and Moira Neal ("Graffiti Granny!"), Steve Carrington for Histon Hornets, and 2 of our Councillors, Tim Ewbank and Elaine Farrell, on efforts being made to retain the special feel of our High Street, working with local businesses. With the popularity of real fires, Anglia offers all sorts of products, from inset and freestanding woodburning and multifuel stoves and pellet stoves, to fireplaces and accessories. Mike Petty's Histon and Impington Newspaper Scrapbook 1880-1990

Since his retirement from the Cambridge Collection and as the local historian for the Cambridge News, Mike has continued to scan the back copies of Cambridge newspapers for extracts of local interest. Below, an item that may be of interest to the new management of The Boot.

1902

The landlord of the Boot Inn had the

very nasty experience of being tossed by an infuriated bullock at Cambridge Cattle Market. The animal, a Scottish beast with very long horns, was driven into a pen when it broke away, caught Mr Vialls with its horns and threw him over the rails into one of the pens. The horns penetrated his trousers and made a scratch about seven inches long. The wild beast was eventually safely secured and sold to a Mr Mills of Cambridge without being brought into the auction ring.

The Big Tidy Up Events

We are pleased to welcome a third business on the Vision Park who want to join us. They are UL in Compass House who are to litter pick the neglected Mere Way Roman Path from Butt Lane to CRC at Kings Hedges. The Royal Bank of Scotland and Paysafe regularly join us in litter picking areas such as the Guided Bus Way paths and verges.

Students at Impington Village College also litter pick their immediate area during term times, and Histon Scouts and Brownies also include litter picking in their activities.

The long-established Impington Litter Pickers and WI groups have always litter-picked their defined areas once a month and join in The BTU events too.

The BTU events are quarterly, and are normally the first weekend of March, June, September and December.

Mobile Warden Scheme

Histon and Impington have a Mobile Warden

Scheme which is designed to help older people who may need some support, to live at home independently, for as long as possible. We are very fortunate in having Mrs Gillian Berry, a village resident, as



Warden. She keeps in contact with clients by regular visits and phone calls. She also helps in practical ways, such as shopping or collecting pensions, giving help with forms or putting her clients in touch with other agencies, as well as providing them with much needed personal and moral support. Our Warden has a good working relationship with Jean Newman, The Older Persons' Co-Ordinator, the Firs House Surgery and those who run the mini-bus and the Day Centre. This means that she is often informed of people who might need her services and others learn of the scheme by word of mouth. Currently, she has 22 households under her care, which is very close to the maximum she can manage.

This scheme is working well in our villages. It is funded by contributions from the County Council, SCDC, the Parish Council and the contributions paid by the clients for the service. It is managed very efficiently for us, at the moment, by Age UK. If we have a mild winter, there should be fewer critical issues during the colder weather, but bed-blocking is still a problem at Addenbrooke's. When the hospital is under pressure, there are likely to be incidents of patients sent home with insufficient warning and inadequate care in place. This is when the work of Gillian Berry, as well as concerned neighbours and other care organisations in the village is critical.

We are remarkably well served in our two villages by the many people who provide services for our older residents but our Mobile Warden Scheme is notable for the practical way it enables people to continue living safely in their own homes. We are indebted to Mrs Berry for her tireless work - I am sure all those she helps would agree.

The High Street and Beyond

Much has happened on the High Street recently; most notably, the renovation and re-opening of The Boot as part of The White Brasserie chain.

The Totally Locally concept of the benefits of shopping nearby is being actively promoted

by shops in our villages. You may have seen their posters in shop windows and there will be more to come over the next few months. Our villages made it into the last 19 of the national Village of the Year competition, which included a plug promoting the High Street as a shopping destination.





In terms of

upcoming events along the High Street, the library is organising an Egg Hunt with a difference over Easter: a quest to find books hidden in the windows of shops on the High Street and beyond. The books to be found will be on show in the library from Easter Saturday until the end of the school holidays. Families can pick up an entry form with map from Histon Library and return it to the library for an eggy reward and entry into a great prize draw.

This is a good example of the kind of crossbusiness promotion that helps the village economy, by encouraging people to visit local shops they might not otherwise have considered. We are grateful to the many local traders who are participating and to those donating prizes.

Over the next few months, the number of planters along the High Street will increase from the one on the Green. In addition to their aesthetic impact, the planters are entirely locally sourced; an example of the Totally Locally principles in action.

From HI Village to the High Seas

There was a really good turnout for the talk on "Plastics: From HI Village to the High Seas. How they get there and what we can do about it", that was held in St Andrew's Centre on 7 February. Many thanks to Dan Steadman, the marine plastics expert and Girton neighbour, for a sobering but inspiring talk about the many different plastics and microplastics that end up in the sea, such as straws, bottles and even microfibres from washing our fleeces. The picture below is one of the slides that were shown. We also learned of inspiring community campaigns that are reducing plastic waste. This was followed by an hour of Q&A and brainstorming of ideas. We came up with some simple and practical ways for us to make a positive difference, both individually and collectively, as well as some more ambitious plans. How are your local shops reducing plastic?

St Andrew's Café - use paper straws, paper take-away cups with bio-degradable lids, they also sell reusable "keep" cups.

The Boot - only use biodegradable straws and they are given on request.

The King Bill - use cardboard straws and wooden stirrers.

The Geographer - use biodegradable straws and take-away cutlery. They sell bamboo keep cups and the first drink is free with each purchase. Customers can bring their own containers for take-out soup, salads and deli items. All the soaps and cleaning products sold are re-fillable and they stock eco ranges of toiletries and toilet roll.

Les Ward - if you order by phone from their Cottenham shop, it will be delivered free locally (orders over £10) with no plastic at all.

How Did Our Birds Fare in 2017

Bird ringing continued in the villages last year and the results showed that a further 192 individuals were processed of 19 different species. This involved a total of 15 sessions, most in the mornings. As usual the most

commonly encountered species was the Blue Tit; the others included Collared Dove, Wren, Dunnock, Robin, Lesser Whitethroat,




Whitethroat, Blackcap, Chiffchaff, Willow Warbler, House Sparrow, Chaffinch, Greenfinch, Goldfinch and Linnet.

When looking at the data collected, House Sparrow numbers have improved in recent years locally. This is great news as the Sparrow is a red listed bird of conservation concern. There is more information on this here, https://www.rspb.org.uk/birds-and-wildlife/wildlife-guides/uk-conservation-status-explained/ and it is basically a red/orange/green light status of the health of the population of that species.

Our sites have seen a reduction in Whitethroat numbers in the last couple of years due to the loss of the scrubby habitat they like. The total catch of Great Tits was down, although we did observe a good number of juveniles so they had a good breeding season. We failed to catch any birds previously ringed elsewhere last year but the re-catch of one of our Willow Warblers (the first for us) was a welcome record. This bird will have undertaken the 5000 mile migration across the Sahara into Africa.

During our sessions, we often observe other birds flying and almost every time we are treated to views of a buzzard, something that never happened here 20 years ago.

GARDENER'S WORD

The Garden in Spring

I admit I am occasionally a very lazy gardener - if I can leave something to nature, then I will. I really hit rock bottom last



autumn though, with my wizard wheeze to let the hens dig over the borders for me. The idea was to let them eat the chickweed, eat the slugs and wireworms and leave me with fresh earth (and manure) ready for a mulch that the worms could draw down over winter months.

What I ended up with was stones all over the lawn, the more delicious flowering plants in shreds and some well-fertilised nettles ready to take over once things warm up. Although the hens' claws do a nice cultivating job, they also trample the soil down a surprising amount.

For those of you who don't have to contemplate your own stupidity by attempting to combine poultry rearing with keeping a decorative and productive garden, now is the time to make some choices. The labour intensive (but more rewarding) way remove weeds now and aerate bare soil. Check over your seed stores and buy new ones. Order young plants. Plan the year ahead. I am particularly keen on late flowering plants such as dahlias, rudbeckias, penstemon and repeat-flowering roses to make the autumn months so much more enjoyable. Time to prune clematis, buddleia and roses.



The lazier way is - do nothing now. Wait until a warm day round about Easter. Suddenly spring into action and clear a space. Maybe start pruning bushes and then realise there are birds nesting. Injure your back or eyes. Retreat. A few weeks later buy ready-grown bedding plants, put them in the ground, water generously and retreat to a comfy chair.

There. It is amazing what you can get away with!

Annual Parish Meetings

The Annual Parish Meetings for each Parish of Histon and Impington are to be held on Monday 14 May, from 7pm at St Andrew's Centre, School Hill, Histon. As well as items of interest to you in your parish, you can hear from the Parish Council Chairman about the previous year, and expect a short report on parish finances.

Hopefully there will be speakers on matters of interest to our villages and the chance to chat with others over some refreshments

What is it?

- Every English parish must have a parish meeting
- The meeting consists of local government electors registered for the area.
- The meeting must assemble between
 1 March and 1 June and may be convened by the Parish Council Chairman or by 6 electors for the area for which it is held
- A minimum of 7 days notice of agenda must be given
- ♦ The quorum of a Parish meeting is 2
- Decisions are taken in the first instance by a majority of those present and voting. Voting does not need to be counted but can be based on overwhelming majority

In all but a very few cases, any decision reached as a resolution is "persuasive" only and may not subsequently be passed by the Council.

The right of the parish meeting to discuss parish affairs extends to any public matter of a parochial nature and is NOT confined to the exercise of the statutory functions of the Parish Council.

The Committee will now turn its attention to the remaining boards to bring them all up to a better standard at a minimum cost. A window in the remaining brick shelter in Cottenham Road is on order.

Many people reading this will be unaware of the excellent Community Transport initiatives in our villages. We are able to help reduce isolation and give people within our community, especially the elderly and less mobile, the opportunity to engage with others. This is very important for a person's independence and wellbeing.

We are able to offer transport with our own Community Minibus, the Community Car Scheme and Dial a Ride.

Histon & Impington Community (HICOM) Minibus

HICOM is a village-based charity whose principal objective is the general community wellbeing of residents of all ages in the villages of Histon and Impington. Formed in 1998, HICOM

- Operates the village Minibus
- Employs the village Older Persons' Coordinator and assistant
- Employs the Mental Wellbeing Worker

In recent weeks, you might have thought that you were seeing double as there have been two minibuses parked at the Baptist Church or driving around the villages. That is because we have just picked our new bus (well, new to us anyway!). At the time of writing, we are busy training up our drivers to use the new bus.

The new bus will continue to provide a service to those in the villages who cannot easily get around. Trips include:

None of this would have happened if it weren't for the initiative and continuous work of Neil Davies and Keith Palmer over the past 28 years and we are eternally grateful to them both.



Saving Hedgehogs

Histon Brownies challenge the village

Did you know that since the 1950s the UK hedgehog population has declined from 35 million to 1 million? A decline of natural habitat and increased use of pesticides in the countryside has taken its toll, but so has the way we manage our gardens. When Histon Brownies heard about this, they were scared that hedgehogs could become extinct and decided to do something about it. They designed a poster and delivered it around part of the village, and had a short article in

the Village Network magazine; but they want the whole village to join in the challenge so, through HISIMP News, they

will now

tell you more about it.

I talked to Histon Brownies, Isabelle, Esme, Jessie, Chloe and Phoebe.

"Hedgehogs need to travel about a mile every night to find food and they need to go through lots of gardens; our fences make a barrier and they can get stuck in one garden".

"You can make a CD-size hole in the bottom of your fence, its not very big" (that's 13cm square).

"If you can't cut a hole, you can use a spade to dig underneath".

"Its great that someone can come and help you make the hole in your fence" [Yes, the Hedgehog Gardens group have volunteers waiting to hear from anyone who needs help].

Esme thought that fence manufacturers should start to put holes in every fence they make automatically - any fence builders out there, can you help?.

Isabelle said she would be devastated if hedgehogs became extinct and urged everyone, "Please save the nation's favourite mammal!"

As well as making holes in fences, it is just as important to know which areas of the village are open for hedgehogs to roam and where more help is needed. Together with Hedgehog Gardens Histon, Impington and Orchard Park Group, the Brownies have created a survey to find out. Both groups will be at the Histon Feast with news about the

survey and more about saving Hedgehogs. We want to make our village into a Hedgehog Super Highway. Please take part in the survey.

Enviro. Vols

A great co-operation between the

enviro.volunteers, the Parish Council, the Scouts and Tates Tree Work.

You may have noticed there has been a hive of activity at The Burial Ground on a few Saturday mornings in February. This was all down to the first enviro.volunteer



working party of the year. It started on a cold but sunny morning. Despite it being a big project we weren't daunted as we were joined by a group of scouts who were working towards their World Challenge Award. The Parish Council had needed to fell a number of old, diseased trees and as part of their commitment to maintain their tree stock had purchased six young trees.

To start, we needed to clear the site. This meant we needed to trim back the holly hedge, clear a lot of bramble, ash and sycamore saplings and ivy before we could even think about digging holes for the new trees!

We tackled the hardest section first, despite nature's best efforts to deter us with thorns of every description, and we managed to make a huge impact on the first day. We not only cleared the site but also used all the vegetation we had cut out to build a dead hedge along the B1049 boundary. This hedge serves several purposes. It not only uses up our waste material, it also provides a refuge for wildlife, creates a barrier/screen and helps to absorb the traffic noise. So a good all round winner.

The next Saturday's working party was much the same; finally, on the third Saturday the trees arrived, courtesy of the truck kindly provided by Tates Tree Work. After offloading the trees, we measured out the site, worked out the spacing and finally got round to do the digging and planting. The trees were planted in a line; to add interest, we alternated the varieties which included 2 hornbeams, 2 purple plums and 2 chinese red birch trees, so lots of year-round interest!

We managed to get them in before the snow, but still have a little more clearance work and mulching to do, which no doubt will be completed by the time you read this.

Archaeology Group (HIAG)

The Archaeology Group held two well

attended Open
Evenings in
February to
showcase local
archaeology,
featuring finds,
interpretation

coincide with the
Open Evenings,
we launched our
first publication,



a booklet describing the findings and interpretation of the results of the Histon & Impington "Big Dig" programme. Copies can be purchased from Histon Library or at HIAG events.

One positive outcome of the extensive largescale development currently being carried out across South Cambridgeshire is that there has recently been a remarkable amount of archaeological investigation going on locally. The excavation of the substantial Romano-British settlement at the site of the new town of Northstowe, was the subject of a fascinating talk on 12 March by Alison Dickens of Cambridge Archaeological Unit. The A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon £1.5billion upgrade is currently the site of the largest archaeological investigation project in the UK, involving hundreds of archaeologists. We plan to host a talk on 10 September about the highlights of these investigations.

On 9-10 May we will once again be hosting an archaeology field school run by the Access Cambridge Archaeology outreach unit from the University of Cambridge. These field schools aim to raise the aspirations, enthusiasm and attainment of 14-17-year-olds in higher education, while at the same time making a valuable contribution to current

academic research on medieval settlement. Participants spend two days under experienced supervision running their own small



(1m²) archaeological test pit, and a third day is spent at the University. If at the end of the two days of excavation by the students any of the sites look promising for further excavation, then HIAG plan to carry on excavating over the following weekend with a team of volunteers. If you have a site for a test pit you could offer to support this project, particularly if it is within easy walking distance of the base at Histon Baptist Church, please do contact us. We are also

looking for volunteers to help with the follow up excavations - no previous experience necessary! You might think that development of the Neighbourhood Plan has been going on for years. Well you'd be right. It's a slow process. But version 1.0 has just been published, check it out on www.hiplan.net, and we're into a largely technical phase before we go to the final adoption referendum.

Even in its present form it is proving useful. Because it sets out the conditions to which the Community proposes that future developments should conform, it is a framework for the Parish Council to work with when it talks to developers. They can then be guided towards ideas which the Community might support. This happened recently when the new owners of the School Hill site came to talk about their development plans. It was a relaxed, very early stage meeting and we were pleased that they are broadly compliant with the Neighbourhood Plan which calls for new development of the site to preserve the existing retail offering but allows for the addition of flats above.

It has also proved useful in getting us to focus on current community assets which we do not want to lose. These include the obvious green spaces, like the playing field on New School Road, but also includes footpaths including informal ones in the Green Belt. We should have a network of such paths and our Neighbourhood Plan process is forcing us to identify and protect them.

Although we are in a 'technical phase' there's still time to input to the Plan either



informally to me or formally when there will be a consultation before the summer.
