Histon Crossroads Works Update

Works began on site on 8 April as planned with our contractors working alongside UK Power Networks who had to divert one of

their supply cables to enable us to construct the new kerb line.



Unfortunately this took UKPN much

longer than anticipated due to the unexpected depth of the ducting and the depth of the carriageway construction layers making excavation more difficult.

The Cambridgeshire Highways gang also encountered some issues on the north side of the Impington Lane junction in that the culvert from The Green ended up clashing with our works. As a result works have progressed slower than hoped for, as extra hand-digging around the structure and the casting of a protection slab was required. This has also encompassed a protection slab for the gas service which runs through the culvert and diverting a Virgin Media cable that had insufficient cover as it was laid on top of the culvert.

The majority of civils work will be completed by 21 June with only the carriageway surfacing, anti-skid and road markings to be carried out in the week beginning 24 June. These will be carried out under the current provision of three-way temporary traffic lights and will not affect the fair set-up on The Green.

Despite these set-backs, the gang have worked extremely hard to make up the lost time and we are currently programmed to finish on Friday 28 June, which is day 58 of an estimated programme of 57 days.

I appreciate that these works have caused significant inconvenience to a lot of residents and thank you for your patience.

All Systems go for The Hub

After nine months of planning and fundraising, proposals for a new online news and information service for Histon and Impington are finally able to move ahead.

Development work has now begun on the framework for a website linked with a weekly village e-newsletter service, available free of charge to everyone who signs up.

This progress is entirely due to the wonderful generosity of residents, local businesses and community groups who have contributed to a major crowdfunding campaign; supportive sponsors who have made a major commitment to the project; and the Parish Council and South Cambs District Council, who have invested their funds to develop this project.

A grant from the National Lottery Community Fund has also been successful. This will be used to build and train, to ensure that every single household and every trader and business with connections to the village is aware of The Hub and can take advantage of the benefits it will bring.

In addition, there will soon be an opportunity for local people to get involved in the news and information gathering at the heart of the new service. As well as community reporters, photographers and editors, the Hub will need close links with representatives from community groups, service providers and businesses so that everyone can be better connected to the vibrant range of activities available in the village.

Chairman's Annual Report May 2019

This is my second report as the Parish Council Chairman and, as last year, I will look to discuss the previous year's activities and some of my thoughts for the future.

It's been a productive but challenging year for the Council with several long term projects/activities continuing on from last year (and before). The Community Park Project at Milton Road has seen a number of public consultations which proved very informative for the sub-committee, which has been working hard over the last year addressing the questions and concerns raised at these events to ensure the community needs and concerns are addressed. An outline planning application has recently been submitted by the housing association and landowners, and a decision is expected later in the year.

The A14 work and project continues at pace and the Council has recently appointed a Councillor to the A14 action group to ensure help, support and advice can be provided to residents where possible.

The Neighbourhood Plan has passed a number of pre-submission tests and a number of well attended public consultations. It is



hoped that a vote on the Plan will take place this year.

Looking forward, the threat of overdevelopment

will always exist in a community like ours; close links to Cambridge and



London and amenities makes it a desirable place to live. With development comes several factors - including more people, more traffic and more strain on key services. Our ability to control this is limited and that is why it's important we as a Council and Community do what we can. Passing the Neighbourhood Plan when it's put to a community vote (referendum) will ensure developers must follow our agreed approach/ desires via the planning policies, safeguarding what we have identified as important. Without this, we have very little say in what's put forward. There are already several plans for development in existence including the School Hill site, land off Impington Lane and the Station Area. But are our facilities and services ready and able to cope? We cannot afford to react to demand, as that's too late. We must act now! The new primary school is a good example of this. Figures and data suggest another school is/ will be required and that's why it is being

built. It's not for today; it's for the future. But what about other services? Can and will our transport links cope? We need to start asking the question now not tomorrow.

Our long-serving Clerk Angela Young is retiring after 25 years in the role. From a personal point of view Angela will be greatly missed as her support and guidance to me as Chairman has been invaluable. I am sure you will enjoy your retirement; you have deserved it.

As one door closes and another door opens - Chelsea O'Brien has been Acting Clerk for a number of months and I'm pleased to say Chelsea has accepted the position of Clerk from July 2019. We all look forward to working with her in the future.

I would like to thank all of the Parish Council staff (Angela Young, Chelsea O'Brien, Lynda Marsh, Steve Campin, Trevor Smith and Alex Hale) for their hard work and dedication to their jobs. Their work often and regularly goes beyond what is expected and can be unnoticed by many. It's very much appreciated by myself, fellow Councillors and I'm sure the residents.

I would also like to thank all Councillors for their hard work and dedication to the role; you should all be proud of the impact you are having on our community; however, there is always more which can be done. So, keep up the good work.

Finally, this year also saw a long-standing Councillor, Josephine Teague, step down from the council. I personally will miss Josephine's words of wisdom and advice and I wish her all the best.

On an even sadder note, this year saw the passing of Alan Eade; a longstanding former Councillor, he will be sadly missed by friends, family and the community.

Parish Council Accounts 18-19

The precept this year for Histon and Impington is for £359,981 and has increased by 2.97%, an extra 6p per week on the Parish element of the Council Tax on a Band D property. Our revenue budget largely matches the amount requested for precept. The Council's plans for capital projects may need to be part-funded from general reserves. Of course, these may not all come to fruition.

Our main sources of income are from the Parish Precept (the parish part of the Council Tax bill provided by South Cambs District Council), facilities charges including those for the Recreation Ground, Burial Ground, allotment, grants and hire of open spaces. We are also keen to obtain grant funding where available, and are lucky to be recipients of donations from the Friends of The Rec, who run a variety of community events and fundraisers in the village, as well as an ever-growing choice of classes in our Community Room, such as the Stroke Recoverers Group and Chair Based Activity Class, and Table Tennis, Tai Chi classes, Memory & Co-Ordination Group and Dance & Fitness Class.


The Council itself financially supports a Diabetes Support Group and Youth services.

The Parish Council increasingly realises that services are going to be devolved down to the Parish Council from higher authorities who are being forced to cut their own budgets. The Council believes it is, and needs to be, in a healthy position to enable any such funding to be available for services which are seen to be imperative to our residents as a whole. We have earmarked a budget heading under "Community Services" for this purpose.

Any person interested has the right to inspect and make copies of the accounts to be audited.

Trevor Silk 24/10/1932 - 14/04/2019

Trevor was on Impington Parish Council for 27 years and we were all sad to hear that he passed away in April. Members of the Parish Council attended a memorial service on 16 May at Histon Baptist Church where Trevor's daughter delivered a wonderful eulogy.

We learned Trevor grew up in Willingham, where his father ran the village grocery shop. Trevor helped out in the shop and learnt to drive the delivery van at age fourteen. At the age of eighteen, he was called up to do National Service and was stationed at Bletchley Park. Trevor met Hilary Whitehead, when they were both 16, at the dances at Impington Village College, where groups of teenagers from the local villages gathered to socialise.

After National Service, Trevor became a Cadbury's chocolate rep. His 'patch' was in the Luton area, and it was here that the newly-married Mr and Mrs Silk set up their first home in a flat near the Luton Football ground. A son and a daughter followed in the early 60's.

He had always wanted to run his own business, and realised this dream in 1965 when he opened 'Menswear' at 226 Mill Road, Cambridge.

Trevor's love of travel started when he went to Austria with his father before he got married. Trevor kept records of all his travels from 1992 to 2014. During this time, Trevor and Hilary visited most of the countries of Europe, Russia, New Zealand, South Africa, Canada, America and Australia.

Trevor loved gardening. Trevor and Hilary created all their gardens from scratch, laying out lawns, beds and vegetable plots with care and hours and hours of hard work. The flowers were Hilary's domain, and Trevor acted under her strict directions, but the lawns were his pride and joy.

Trevor was also a wonderful dancer. Trevor and Hilary graduated from the first old-time dancing sessions at Impington Village College when they were teenagers to a lifelong love of ballroom dancing. Trevor and Hilary continued to dance, and to have dancing lessons, until they were in their eighties, latterly enjoying the Sequence Dances at the Histon British Legion.

Trevor had a strong sense of duty and responsibility. He initiated the daffodil planting scheme for the village, and would supervise the groups of volunteers who planted the bulbs on cold October and November mornings. With his customary planning and care, he would photograph the flowers in Spring, so that he could plan for filling in the gaps in the following Autumn.

Trevor liked everything to be done properly, and often said, "If a job's worth doing, it's worth doing well." He lived a good life, true to his values. He gathered friends wherever he went, making friends locally, on his travels and in dancing classes, and he always kept in touch. He was a kind man, unfailingly courteous and never angry. When his daughter Alison drove him to hospital, he took pride in pointing out all the areas where the daffodils that he had planted were flowering. To her, they will always be symbols of his life - a job that was done so very well.

Next Spring, when you see them blooming in the sunshine, please remember him.

GARDENER'S WORD

The Garden in Summer

Plants in pots are the saviour of many a dull or neglected garden. Ran out of time earlier in the year? Run out of space to insert a

new star? Never mind, put it in a large container and treat it like a pampered pet. Don't cut corners, this is all about pizazz for one year only. Then your exhausted divas can retire to the compost heap or be planted out to grow larger.

Don't use last year's compost as it will be drained of nutrients, full of roots and too compacted. If you absolutely must - a large

pot can use up a whole bag - then scrape out the top 6 inches and replace with fresh. But do it properly next year.

Top tip: move the pot into position before filling makes it heavy.

Starting with multi-

use peat free compost, add some grit to keep it open and water-retaining granules such as swell gel. Add granular fertiliser with high potassium, such as a tomato one. As I said, don't cut corners.

Choosing plants - well you can go to town as it's all about show. I like to keep to a reduced colour theme - i.e. just blues and yellows, or a hot jazzy pink, but that's me. You can even cram in things that aren't going to fit into a pot by next year. I also like to make sure at least one has a delicious perfume by a sunny doorway because that's where you'll stop to sniff.

OK, you've mixed, you've planted, you've swept up the mess and now - water water water! Those pot-grown plants will quickly show stress if they're neglected as they are more vulnerable to evaporation than being put in the ground. And a fortnightly water with seaweed solution will not go amiss.



Mix your pot or mix your pots - groups of singles give you even more of a chance to keep it fresh.


Police News

Poilce and Crime Commissioner (PCC), Jason Ablewhite is inviting people to have their say on his proposal to build a new station on the outskirts of

Milton.

Over the past year, a team of experts has been working alongside the PCC to identify suitable sites to construct a new police station which will serve Cambridge City and the south of the county.

A number of other locations have been looked at, but the proposed site at Milton provides the Chief Constable with the best location to meet operational demand. This site has better road access and will



Whilst the proposed new station will service the south of the county, a Police Information Point and community policing team will remain within Cambridge city, the precise location of which will be decided in due course.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite explains:

"With Cambridgeshire's population set to grow by 20% by 2030, it's vital that the Chief Constable has the resources he needs to meet growing demand.

Parkside Police Station has provided a good service since it was constructed in 1967. However the layout of the building does not meet modern policing requirements and the number of custody cells needs increasing. At present, when these are full, police officers have to transport the people they arrest to Peterborough. Clearly this takes them away from attending other calls for service in Cambridge and the surrounding area."

Chief Constable, Nick Dean:

"The proposed site for a new police station for the south of the county in Milton is based around the operational need of the force to work more efficiently and effectively, as well as to improve our custody facilities.

The aim is for the new site to future-proof our ability to police Cambridgeshire, given the level of growth anticipated in the surrounding areas, and the changing nature of crime and demand on our services."




Birds Ringed in Histon & **Impington**

Time has come around for me to provide an update on the birds ringed in Histon/ Impington during 2018. The total of 161 is lower than the 192 of 2017 but higher in terms of birds caught per ringing session. The number of species was also a little lower with only 17 contributing, with blue tits topping our charts as usual. Long tailed tit

appeared to have had an excellent breeding season though with large family groups around.

Really positive observations are the recovery of greenfinches after the trichomonas parasite that reduced



Numbers have recovered, and you can all contribute with bird health by keeping your garden bird feeders as clean as possible.

In terms of breeding birds, it was good to have lapwing and grey partridge in the village, but we failed to detect any turtle doves. This species has declined in the UK by a staggering 97% in the last 50 years!

As for my garden observations, the highlights were firsts of grey wagtail and red-legged partridge. Other less regular species seen were brambling, siskin and stock dove.

The local group will be demonstrating what ringing involves and the data collected at the now annual Feast week Bird in Hand event at the Community Orchard Breakfast. This is on Sat 29 June from 9.30am-12pm and is your opportunity to see some of our local birds up close, so do come along and support this.

Potential merger of two village charities

The Trustees of Histon & Impington Community (aka HICOM) and Friends of Histon & Impington Recreation (aka Friends of the Rec) have been discussing the possibility of a merger to form a new charity.

The two charities are both well known in the village community;

Histon & Impington Community (HICOM), formed in 1998, operates the Community Minibus and the HICOM Wellbeing team which includes the Village Older People's, Dementia and Mental Wellbeing Workers. In addition, it runs the Histon Worry Tree Café and the Hope Again Bereavement Group.

Friends of the Rec, which started in 2003, organises sporting and exercise activities for people of all ages. For example, the Friends organise HI Community Athletics for young people, the HI Rec Monday Club providing social exercise classes and the Village Community trishaw.

The Friends also organise large community events such as the recent Impington Running Festival, Flaming June Half Marathon and Strawberry 50 cycling event. Funds raised help to fund improvements at the Recreation Ground, for example new picnic benches in the Rec Play area.

Working together. In recent years, both charities have gravitated towards providing more general wellbeing support and have worked closely together. For example, the Wellbeing Team promotes the activities that the Friends of the Rec organise, with HICOM providing community minibus transport.

More recently, both charities worked together on the Village Wellbeing Week and produced a combined newsletter delivered to all village homes.


A potential new charity would provide services for all generations and will be able to promote and organise activities and opportunities under one umbrella.

Around 150 residents may have Type 2 diabetes and don't know it!


Statistics for the UK show that 5.7% of the population - around 1 in 18 of us - have been diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. For Histon and Impington, that's around 600 people. Unfortunately, there are probably another 150 who have Type 2 diabetes but don't know it. Could one of them be you?

Type 2 diabetes is a serious condition where the insulin your pancreas makes can't work properly, or your pancreas can't make enough insulin. We all need insulin to live - it does an essential job. It allows the glucose in our blood to enter our cells and fuel our bodies. When you have Type 2 diabetes, your body still breaks down carbohydrate from your food and drink and turns it into glucose. The pancreas responds to this by releasing insulin. But because this insulin can't work properly, blood glucose (also called sugar) levels keep rising. So more insulin is released. For some people with Type 2 diabetes this can eventually tire the pancreas out, meaning their body makes less and less insulin. This causes even higher blood sugar

So what does this mean? Well, as your body can't get enough glucose into your cells, a common symptom of Type 2 diabetes is feeling very tired. Other symptoms include needing to wee a lot, feeling extremely thirsty, cuts and grazes healing slowly, and getting infections like thrush. A lot of people don't get any symptoms or they don't notice them. Some people don't think the symptoms are important so don't ask for help. This means that some people live with Type 2 diabetes for up to 10 years before being diagnosed. Over a long period of time, high sugar levels in your blood can seriously damage your heart, your eyes, your feet and your kidneys.

If you think you may be at risk of diabetes then try a questionnaire recommended by the NHS: riskscore.diabetes.org.uk/start

Orchard Road Community Garden

I was pleased to have been involved with this Community Enterprise Project, to help Sean Firby and Vicky Brasnett obtain permission from South Cambridgeshire District Council and gain support from Histon & Impington Parish Council.

SCDC kindly gave permission for the adoption of the land by residents to create a Community Garden and they agreed to pay for two large wooden planters. The Parish Council agreed to provide funding for a Community Notice Board.

Vicky and Sean have been a great partnership in the project, Sean has made the planters, community notice board, bug hotel and seats and Vicky has designed and supervised the planting of bulbs, shrubs and trees. Special thanks go to Orchard Road resident Darrell Mancini for donating over 100 bedding plants, Paula from Strictly Daylilies who donated the Lilies, Martin Fussenger of Histon Plants for donating plants and discounting others, SP Landscapes and the Parish Council who helped with the costs of bulbs and other plants. Dan Mace of the Community Orchard will be supplying two 'Chivers Delight' Cordon apple trees. Martin Fussenger has kindly offered to help with the pruning. A big thank you to nearby neighbours who have given their support, with use of their electricity, water and green bins.

Vicky says "I wanted to do something at the top of the road that meets Glebe Way. Having seen many changes over time, when the old telephone box was removed by BT it was a good opportunity. Getting the children to help plant the crocus bulbs and to see them grow was lovely. The bug hotel will be fabulous for the children to see who has taken up residency. I think litter picking my area has given me the pride to do more to make Orchard Road Community Garden a place to be proud of and for visitors and passing traffic to admire. Having pride in where you live surely must have a positive effect on people and their wellbeing. Not everyone is lucky enough to have a garden, so having a community garden can only be good for all."

Archaeology Group (HIAG)

HIAG has worked with IVC this academic year to support an extra-curricular archaeology course running over 13 weeks each term. We have provided resources and classroom support, demonstration of geophysics equipment and excavation experience, all of which are part of an ongoing project to uncover medieval Impington, some of which we believe lies under the College site.

IVC was built in the grounds of the former Impington Hall, an Elizabethan era manor house, constructed circa 1600 by the Pepys family who demolished an earlier medieval manor house. We believe that to make way for the gardens surrounding their grand new hall, they cleared part of medieval Impington and the people were moved out to "Little Impington" close to where the war memorial now stands. However, no maps earlier than the 19th Century exist to guide us.

Last term in March we dug four test pits in the IVC grounds near Burgoynes Road. We discovered 13 Anglo-Saxon pottery sherds and

66 from the high medieval period. There was very little pottery from 1500 - 1900 which is consistent with the conversion of the site to parkland in the late 16th century.



In one of the pits, 80cm below the present-day

surface, we found an infilled ditch containing Anglo-Saxon and medieval pottery, so very possibly a medieval boundary ditch for one of the properties that was cleared to create the parkland. One particularly interesting find was a rare fragment of medieval pottery water pipe. This indicates that a high-status medieval building stood near our excavation site and possibly it was from the medieval manor house demolished by the Pepys family. It was grand enough for Edward I to stay in 1298.

We plan to explore further medieval Impington in the week beginning 1 July. If you are interested in getting involved - no prior experience is necessary - please use the contact form at

Our next talk 'People and Places from the Past of Histon & Impington' will be by David Oates at 7.30pm on Friday 1 July at Histon Baptist Church. David will introduce us to individuals who have left their mark on the villages, including a discussion of whether archaeologists have unearthed enough evidence to see whether King Peada of Mercia lived in the village in 650 AD.

Every road, footpath and open space has now been adopted by our large band of volunteers. But we would still welcome new volunteers to enable some areas to be split so that individuals are not having to look after more than a couple of roads.

As some will know, we also have a 'Weed Whacking Group' that meets about once a month, normally on a Friday afternoon for no more than 90 minutes. We tackle hot spots where weeds are unsightly.

Out of the Top Drawer - A Rose Grower's Tale

In an earlier edition, the Village Society has asked for information about the local rose

breeder George Northfield. Research continues. Below is an extract from an article he wrote for the 'Rose Bulletin' in 1971, which we thought would make you smile.

"I sow my seeds in wooden boxes..... Every year I destroyed the boxes..... and got new boxes

for the new season....., last December a calamity occurred. The merchant, from whom I had obtained the wooden boxes for years, told me that his suppliers.... now packed their merchandise in cardboard. I managed to scrounge a few wooden boxes of suitable size, but not enough of them and was at my wit's end wondering where to get more..... I discussed the problem with my brother Arthur. He casually mentioned that he was going to chop into kindling wood an old bureau that he possessed. He said that it had four drawers..... which I was welcome to, if they were suitable..... To my delight they might have been fashioned for the express purpose of housing my seedling roses."

"The seedlings were growing sweetly in April when my brother came to see me urgently.... had I still got those drawers? If so could he have them back? A friend of his in the furniture business..... had seen the old bureau..... and asked where the drawers were..... On being told that they were being used as seed boxes he almost had to be helped away........An expert duly arrived.....It was indeed an antique, probably made in the reign of George IV and although in a rough condition was worth a considerable amount of money - with all the drawers!


